# Welcome to Hornberg

Hornberg is a town with a population of around 5,000, situated in the Central Black Forest in the Ortenau district of Baden-Württemberg. The Central Black Forest region is bounded to the west by the Rhine Valley and to the east by the Baar region, which slopes down towards the Upper Neckar Valley. To the north and south, the area is defined by natural boundaries: to the north, the Northern Black Forest in the vicinity of the small river Rench, and to the south by the source streams of the Danube, the Brigach and the Breg. At the heart of this area, in the deeply incised Gutach Valley, lies the small town of Hornberg, situated on massive, coarse-grained, and very hard Triberg granite. The diversity of geology and climatology, and the resulting types of flora, provide a rich variety of fungi throughout the year within a relatively small area.

## Conference venue

Hornberg itself lies at an altitude of around 390 metres above sea level, whilst the planned excursion areas are significantly higher, at 500–950 metres above sea level. These areas have been recognised for decades as hotspots for biodiversity, particularly with regard to the genus *Cortinarius*. Walter Pätzold, former head of the Black Forest Mushroom Exhibition and former president of the J.E.C., has already held the conference in this region on two occasions. The region features a variety of soil conditions (acidic, alkaline) as well as a forest community dominated by conifers (*Picea abies*, *Abies alba*, *Pinus sylvestris*). Although the excursions to the hotspots are certainly a must, it may still be necessary to reschedule to other, similar areas due to adverse weather conditions (dryness). The director of the Black Forest Mushroom Exhibition and organiser of this year's *Cortinarius* Congress, Björn Wergen, along with a number of helpers, will ensure everything is perfectly organised so that this conference is an unforgettable experience for you.

## Workshop

The workshop is being held at the Hotel Schloss Hornberg, not at the Hornberg Town Hall as originally planned and announced. Microscopes and accessories, as well as stereoloupes, are available for hire, though limited to six of each. The hire fee for a microscope, including equipment, is €40 for the entire duration of the conference. The fee for a stereoloupe is also €40.



## History

Around 1100, the first Hornberg Castle of the Lords of Hornberg was built on the lower castle rock near Althornberg (now part of the municipality of Gremmelsbach). Their domain encompassed the Gutach Valley from its source near Schönwald to its mouth north of Gutach, along with its side valleys.

A hundred years later, following the division of their dominion, the Lords of Hornberg moved their seat to the local Schlossberg and founded a small town at the foot of the new castle, which remained walled until the mid-19th century. Soon, small suburbs and commercial districts began to develop to the north and east of the town walls, along the Gutach.

The population lived mainly off through-traffic, which – before the steep ascent through the Schwanen Valley and later the Reichenbach Valley – required horse-drawn transport, accommodation and escorts. In 1383, following a dispute with the lords of Hornberg, the people of Strassbourg burned down the town. Between 1423 and 1448, control of the town gradually passed into the hands of the Counts of Württemberg, and Hornberg became the seat of the Württemberg bailiff.

In 1535, Duke Ulrich of Württemberg introduced the Reformation here, as he did throughout his duchy. During the Thirty Years' War, the town suffered greatly from troop movements and looting. From 1700, Hornberg served as a station on the Thurn and Taxis imperial postal route between Strassbourg, Villingen, Ulm and Munich. As part of the territorial reforms at the beginning of the last century, Hornberg became part of Baden in 1810.

The 19th century brought a boom to the town thanks to the flourishing development of trades (such as wood-carving) and industry (a stoneware factory from 1817), as well as the construction of the Hornberg–Triberg road and the connection to the Offenburg–Konstanz Black Forest Railway. Industry and tourism developed positively until the wars of the 20th century significantly disrupted this favourable upward trend.

During the Second World War, Hornberg suffered severe war damage, from which it soon recovered and strove for renewed positive development. Alongside industry and trade, tourism has become an important economic factor for the town.

This development has been aided by the incorporation of the neighbouring towns of Reichenbach and Niederwasser in the 1970s, which have since become integral parts of Hornberg.

## **Climate and vegetation**

Climatically, the western part, characterised by the Rhine Valley and the larger side valleys (such as the Kinzig), has a distinctly sub-Atlantic influence, as evidenced, among other things, by the abundant presence of *Ilex aquifolium*. Winters are consequently relatively mild and wet.

In the mountain foothills, at altitudes of 700 to 1,150 metres above sea level, we see over 2,000 mm of rainfall per year, whilst in the large valley floors, barely 1,200 mm of rainfall per year falls. East of the main ridge, too, precipitation drops rapidly to between 1,500 and 1,000 mm per year, allowing the silver fir to persist. Here, a significantly stronger continental influence is evident, with hotter summer days and colder winter days. Whilst an early spring and a sunny autumn until the onset of the 'November mists' are typical of the western slopes, the prevailing weather conditions in the eastern part of the region are exactly the opposite.

Depending on altitude and Atlantic influence (in the south-west also sub-Mediterranean via the Burgundian Gate), climates ranging from the mild winters of the lowland Atlantic zone to the cold winters of the Nordic-montane zone can be found, for example in the headwaters of the Danube's tributaries. Accordingly, along the Rhine we still find *Muscari botryoides* and *Tulipa sylvestris*, whilst in the east *Ciberbita alpina*, *Rumex alpinus* and *Adenostyles alliariae* are already defining the landscape.

## **Flora**

This section will focus primarily on trees and a few shrubs. In the west, alongside a variety of softwoods, *Castanea sativa*, *Quercus* spp. and *Fagus* were once particularly prevalent. As altitude and rainfall increase, *Abies alba* joins them, and in high-mountain regions, *Picea abies* also becomes common.

At higher elevations, *Pinus sylvestris* replaces the oak species. In damp areas such as depressions, marshes, and stream and river valleys, *Acer pseudoplatanus*, *Fraxinus excelsior*, *Populus nigra*, *Salix spec.* and *Alnus glutinosa* are found, depending on the degree of moisture. Thanks to human influence, the glacial relict *Alnus viridis* has established itself well from the summits down to the submontane zone. *Corylus avellana* dominates the shrub layer throughout, whilst the remaining shrubs are mainly determined by soil acidity. On the western edge, some stands of *Prunus padus* are found, followed by *Sorbus aucuparia* and *Sorbus aria*. It is only in the eastern Muschelkalk area that species diversity increases, with the calcicolous *Lonicera*, *Viburnum* and *Crataegus* species and *Prunus spinosa*.

Intensive management has given *Picea abies* a dominant position in all sub-regions, and it is only in the numerous extensive farm forests that a near-natural aspect can still be found.



## Geology

From west to east, the same pattern emerges almost everywhere in the region:

The Rhine alluvial plain and the lower alluvial channels of the side valleys are initially succeeded by a belt of sedimentary gneisses, Rotliegend strata and, occasionally, loess cones. Primordial gneisses and, finally, the massive, mostly hard and therefore gently rounded granite formations ultimately form the main mountain range, with few deep valley incisions.

As overlying strata (in places still tens of metres thick, in others almost entirely eroded away), Rotliegend and Buntsandstein form the Black Forest main ridge. Where the overlying strata are absent, the massive bedrock is often overlain by primary gneisses. Alongside the spring-rich sedimentary gneiss, this formation forms the main spring horizon with numerous spring marshes and moors.

The more or less acid-bearing mountain slope and the plateau are abruptly replaced beyond the zenith by Muschelkalk of varying ages, and the terrain slopes down towards the upper Neckar valley through various Keuper formations.

## People and Culture

Originally, only the major river valleys around the bend in the Rhine near Basel and the Upper Rhine Plain from Karlsruhe onwards were densely populated. Over the course of history, an Alemannic cultural sphere emerged, encompassing large parts of German-speaking Switzerland, extending westwards to Alsace as far as the main ridge of the Vosges, westwards to the main ridge of the Black Forest, and southwards to the western shore of Lake Constance. The mindset of the people, shaped by the landscape and the pursuit of sustenance, can still be felt today in farming families steeped in tradition. Political borders seem rather arbitrary in this region. From Schirmeck (Alsace, F) to Schenkenzell (South Baden, D), from Olten (Unterland, CH) to Offenburg (Ortenau, D), the people, their customs and traditions, as well as their daily routines, are very similar. As a result of the modern-day mass migrations caused by the devastating wars of this century, origins have receded into the background in favour of an even more pronounced sense of internationalism.

The cultural centres of Strasbourg, Basel and Freiburg have already grown much closer together with the people of these cities across three nations than politics may have realised. The Cortinarien Congress can help to promote the international character of the states along the Upper and High Rhine, ensuring that unnecessary borders and toll zones become a thing of the past.

## Excursion areas

The following are planned: Hardt-Nord, Kräherwald, Büchereck, Tannengrund, Fohrenbühl (upper and lower sections), Langenschiltach, Doniswald-Königsfeld, Geutsche, Weiler, St. Georgen, Harzloch = all soils acidic to neutral (Triberg granite, but: limestone gravel paths).

Flözlingen, Schabenhäusen and Fischbach are shell limestone areas.

## Electricity

In Germany, the most common electrical plugs are the Type F (Schuko) plug with an earth pin and the flat Type C (Euro plug) without an earth pin. Type C plugs can be used in Type F sockets without any problems.

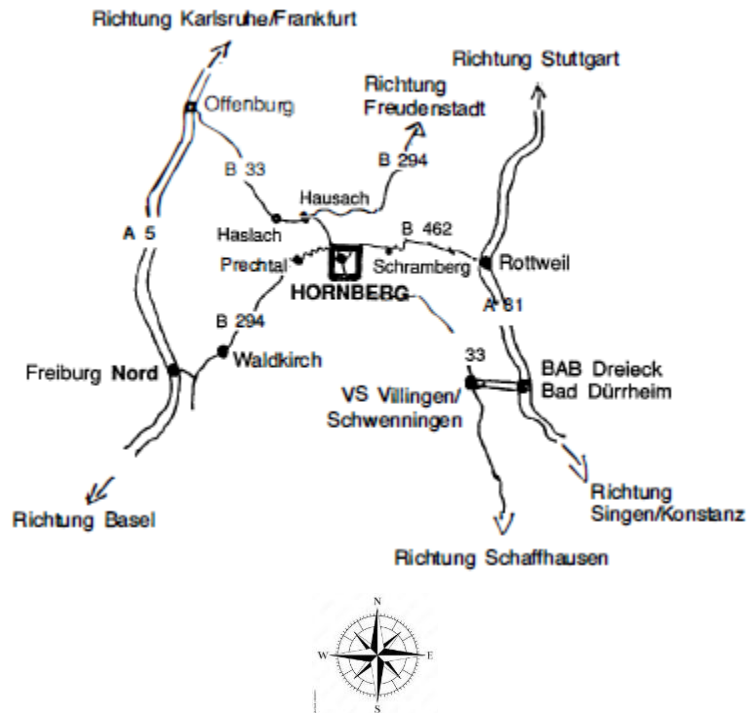


**Type F**

## **Schwarzwälder Freilichtmuseum Vogtsbauernhof Gutach**

The open-air museum covers an area of around 7 hectares; the walking route is approximately 2 km long, and the average visit lasts around 3 hours.

The Vogtsbauernhof in Gutach is the oldest open-air museum in Baden-Württemberg. Here, visitors can learn more about the history and culture of the Black Forest: how people lived, worked and resided in past centuries, and how the Black Forest as we know it today was shaped in its early days. The Vogtsbauernhof has stood on this site since 1612, whereas the open-air museum was not opened until 1964. Since then, the museum has been continuously expanded. Further farmhouses have been added, which were dismantled at their original locations and rebuilt within the open-air museum.



**Wednesday, 21 October 2026**

## **Löffingen, guided tour**

Approx. 54.7 km from Hornberg.

Finds from the Neolithic period, as well as some 2,500 well-preserved stone mounds in the Löffingen area, bear witness to the earliest settlement of the region. They were constructed between 1700 and 1300 BC. The Celts used these burial mounds for secondary burials from 600 to 300 BC. A long-distance trade route led from the Neckar region via Löffingen and Stallegg to the Upper Rhine. A coin of Emperor Domitian attests to the presence of the Romans.

## **Wenzel Mine – Oberwolfach Visitor Mine**

The Wenzel Mine was once one of the richest silver mines in the Black Forest. The earliest record dates from 1700, which mentions a lead and silver vein. Whilst just 32 mineral species were known from the Wenzel Mine by 1835 and around 45 by 1990, some 60 species are now known, which are of great significance to mineralogists.
